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### **CONIFERS**

These handsome trees and shrubs look good all year long, with some of them changing colour in fall and winter. They are excellent for increasing winter interest in your garden, or for forming the "bones" of a bed or landscape. They can be effective planted in groupings, or used as eye-catching specimen trees or shrubs planted as a focal point.

### Dwarf Evergreens

These e compact evergreens are quite slow-growing; it can take 20 years or more for them to reach their full height or width. They rarely require any pruning, and you can have a quite a variety in a small yard.

### **BROADLEAF EVERGREENS**

Along with the conifers, broadleaf evergreens help to form the bones of a garden bed or yardscape all year long, and especially in winter. Some broadleafs are grown for their flowers, others primarily for their foliage.

# RHODODENDRONS AND AZALEAS

Rhododendrons and hardy (deciduous) azaleas do very well in acid, humus-rich but well-draining soil. We carry a wide range of varieties, from dwarf size to large shrubs. Do check out the annual display at the Kentville Agriculture Station in late May-early June.

### JAPANESE MAPLES

Japanese maples can be diva-like in our garden, but they are so worth nurturing. Make sure you give yours adequate winter protection from wind, & excessive snow cover that can cause limb breakage. Our varieties include the following:

### MAGNOLIAS

Many magnolias grow very well in Atlantic Canada. As with any plant, choose the right size magnolia for your growing conditions. Some are compact and ideal for city yards, while others can grow to be commanding trees.

### Dogwoods

The dogwood family includes a number of hardy native shrubs that are popular as shrubs for providing food for wildlife, especially birds, or for showy, colourful twigs in winter.



Then there are the showoffs—the Cornus kousa dogwoods with their long-blooming, very showy flowers. ### REDBUDS

Native to North America, these handsome trees flower in the early spring, then leaf out with gorgeous heart-shaped foliage.





There are numerous cultivars available, including several with rich purple foliage. We carry: Cercis native form, Ruby Falls, Lavender Twist, Forest Pansy

### **Shrubs**

Shrubs and trees are excellent choices for gardeners wanting low-maintenance plants for their properties. At Baldwin s you ll find native species along with some of the latest and hardiest of cultivars.

### **Hydrangeas**

There are so many different types of hydrangeas that it can be very confusing for the new gardener. The varieties we carry are proven to do well in our climate. Of these, only two are pH sensitive so there may be some variation in flower colour. CLIMBING HYDRANGEA: White lacey flowers festoon this glossy-leafed climber

As with the dogwoods, Viburnums include some sturdy native varieties notable for their fruit, loved by wildlife and birds, and for their great fall colour. There are also more exotic showy-flowered and/or highly fragrant viburnum varieties. We

#### Hellebores

These early bloomers do best in partial shade to full sun in humus rich, moist, but well-draining soil. Because some form their buds in early winter and will bloom in late winter to very early spring, it's a good idea to mulch them after a hard frost, to protect them from freezing and thawing. Varieties may include: Double Ellen Red, White, Niger, Ballard Strain, Blue Lady, Red Lady

#### TREE PEONIES

These beautiful plants produce a show-stopping display of massive flowers every spring, in rich colours. Winter protection is recommended for the first couple of years while the plants are establishing themselves. Hana Kisoi: semidouble, shell pink blooms High Noon: Yellow, double Kamata-nishiki: light purple Kaow: rosy red double, yellow stamens visible Kinkaku: double yellow with orange-red on edge of petals Kinshi: enormous double yellow flowers Kokuryu nishiki: rich red (Black Dragon Brocade) Renkaku: semi double white Rimpoh: rich semi double red Shimodaijin purple-pink Shima-nishiki red/white variegation

### GRASSES

Ornamental grasses may not look like much in the spring, when they are clumps of brownish grey stubble. But by midsummer you ll have fountains of handsome foliage, and some flowers on early-season varieties. Fall and winter is when some varieties, like the miscanthus and panic grasses, come into their own, as they provide terrific winter interest. Try planting grasses out with dwarf and regular sized evergreens for a fantastic display of colour and texture throughout the gardening year.

There are grasses for pretty much every growing condition.

**NOTE:** The few spreaders we sell are for groundcovers, bank stabilizing, and other places where strong roots and spreading growth habit is needed. Ammophila arenaria marram grass

### DEER RESISTANT PLANTS

While many plants may be deer resistant, they are not deer PROOF (unless grown indoors). Often plants with fuzzy foliage, or fragrant/pungent foliage, tend to deter those looking for buffet snacks. Bear in mind a hungry deer will try anything once, even if it's not meant to be palateable to them. One way to deter them is to plant selections like these in front of more tempting varieties. Some good choices include: Anemones
